Education and Fun At 4-H Ag Adventures!



The 4-H Ag Adventures program is a free educational program offered to all first grade students in Jackson County. Jackson County Ag Adventures is held at the UF-IFAS North Florida Research and Education Center and the Beef Research Unit, both located in Greenwood, FL. The goal of this program is to provide a quality, hands-on educational experience for youth to learn the science of agriculture, what it means to our community, county and state, and to foster an appreciation for how the science of agriculture touches their everyday lives. Ag Adventures is mainly supported by grant money from Florida Agriculture in the Classroom, Inc.

This year, Jackson County 4-H hosted Ag Adventures on November 5-6, 2013. Tour guides lead groups of 20-30 students through 12 different agriculture-related stations., which included peanuts, cotton, corn, livestock, dairy and aquaculture. Nearly 390 students benefitted from the program.

Big Changes Coming Involving 4-H Youth Enrollment and Volunteer Leader Enrollment

The month of October brought about major changes regarding enrollment of youth and adult volunteers. All of these changes are to ensure that all activities regarding youth involvement are as safe as possible. Everyone already enrolled as a member or as an adult volunteer needs to visit 4-H online and fill out the appropriate forms, or come into the office and use a paper form. We also have a computer set up in our office for your convenience.

The directions on the 4-H Youth Enrollment Form were updated so that it is clear that the Participation Form is a part of the enrollment process. These forms can be accessed online at the following site:

Changes to the Participation Form include:

- Revised Medical Release/Consent, and revised General Release Statements were added.
- New Transportation Policy added
- Instructions were added to specify which policies or releases require consent to participate in the Florida 4-H (Medical, Code of Conduct, General, and Transportation)
- "Yes" or "No" options have been added to the Media and Survey Releases

***** NOTICE *****

All adults who are listed as club leaders currently have to have background checks done. Effective October 2013, they will also have to be fingerprinted. Leaders who are currently active will have to have their fingerprints done by April, 2014. The following is an excerpt regarding the new rule change:

4-H Volunteer Application Revised and now on 4H Online

The 4-H Volunteer Application has been revised and can now be submitted through 4H Online. Paper applications should only be used at the convenience of clientele, such as when they do not have Internet access. For those cases, the printable PDF version of the Volunteer Application has also been updated. The revised application can be found at <http://florida4h.org/getinvolved>.

4H Online Update: Medical Release, General Release and Transportation Release

Based on recent recommendations made by University Counsel, the General Release and the Medical Release have been revised in 4H Online and on the Florida 4-H Participation Form. In addition, a Transportation Policy has been added to both. The new General Release is more explicit in explaining the potential risks of participating in 4-H activities. The new Medical Release/Consent explains more clearly what 4-H staff will do in the event of a medical emergency and is better aligned with current statutes. The Transportation Policy has been added to ensure that individuals transporting youth know the requirements, and to better inform parents/guardians of 4-H policy.

Ideally, these changes would have been made before enrollment opened for the current year, but we were advised it would be better to implement the changes now instead of waiting until August 2014.

This will not alter active enrollments in 4H Online. Youth and Adults who are currently enrolled and active for this year do not need to update their authorizations. Families and members will be notified about these changes through a broadcast e-mail which will be sent out through 4H Online. This information will also be posted to the 4H Online family homepages.



Make sure that your enrollments are up-to-date to ensure you receive information regarding these important changes as they occur, as well as preventing any interruptions in memberships.

Did You Know...

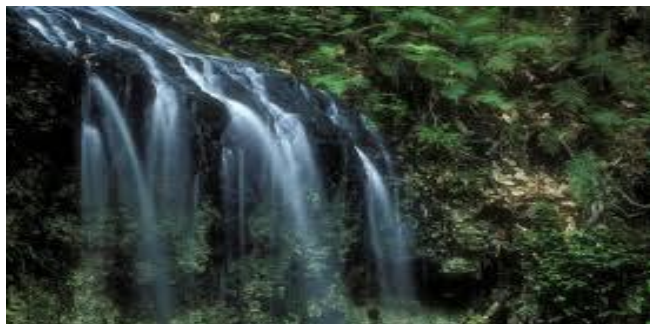
Know your turkey baking facts!



During the holiday season, people are buying turkeys for that big family meal. These tips can help you create a safe and delicious meal.

Fresh and frozen birds differ in cook and storage time, but not taste or quality. When buying a whole turkey, estimate one pound of turkey for each person. Fresh turkeys can be kept in the refrigerator for only one or two days. It is not recommended buying pre-stuffed fresh turkeys as they contain harmful bacteria if handled improperly. Do not thaw pre-stuffed frozen turkeys before cooking. The safest way to thaw a frozen turkey is in the refrigerator, in its original packaging. Allow 24 hours thawing time for every 4-5 pounds of turkey. Turkeys can be cooked frozen, however the cook time needs to be increased by 50%. Cook the turkey immediately after thawing. It is not safe to refrigerate or refreeze a microwave-thawed turkey. When handling any fresh or frozen raw meat, wash your hands, utensils, dishes and kitchen surfaces frequently with hot, soapy water, and use separate knives and cutting boards for the turkey and stuffing. Turkey and other cooked foods should be eaten within two hours. After that time, leftovers should be refrigerated or thrown away. Leftover meat should be eaten within 3-4 days; gravy within 1-2 days.

Explore your back yard at Falling Waters State Park

Have you experienced the cascading waterfalls and breathtaking sink holes at Falling Waters State Park? The park offers something for everyone, whether it be fishing, camping, hiking or swimming. Home to several species of protected plants and animals, the park offers excellent wildlife viewing opportunities. There are excellent picnicking facilities, as well. Bring the whole family out to spend a day exploring!

Falling Waters State Park is located three miles south of Chipley off State Road 77. Turn left on State Park Road and follow it to the park entrance. From I-10, take the Chipley exit south on State Road 77 and follow signs to the park.
