






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gARTening: Pound Flower Art

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Materials:	Tips:

1. Gather fresh flowers and foliage. Younger leaves	2. Assess your flowers/foliage and start arranging

3. When satisfied, begin flipping over your flower/ foliage. It is helpful to gently tape them to prevent them from moving during the process.	4. Place a paper towel on top of them and begin pounding. (Hint- avoid paper towels that have impressions/patterns on them. The pattern may transfer.)

- 5. Using moderate force, continue pounding until pigment begins to bleed through your paper towel. This is an indication that the transfer is complete.
- Gently, begin removing the paper towel. Some leaves/foliage may remove with it, that is okay.
 Begin peeling back the tape and peeling back remaining flowers/foliage.



7. Once all remaining petals and leaves are removed, your design is complete! Frame & enjoy!
